The unsettled global environment has also highlighted the importance of a strong defence sector, and how vital it is to have a supportive local manufacturing sector to protect against possible disruption in global supply chains.

It should be a priority for all of us to help promote and support a healthy and growing manufacturing sector for our future prosperity and security

MORAY & AGNEW LAUNCHES REFLECT RECONCILIATION ACTION PLAN

Moray & Agnew Lawyers has implemented its recently launched Reflect Reconciliation Action Plan (RAP) for 2025-26, reaffirming the firm's commitment to justice, equity and meaningful reconciliation with Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples.

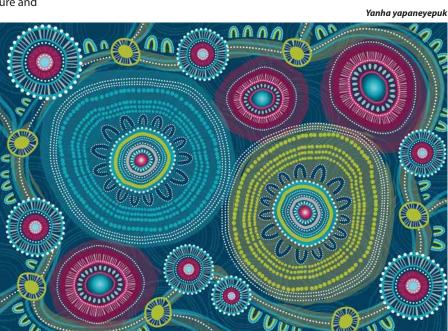
The RAP outlines the firm's commitment to deepening understanding and respect for Indigenous culture and

communities, improving socio-economic outcomes for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples and organisations, and actively promoting reconciliation. These goals will be achieved by fostering stronger relationships with Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples and organisations, and by supporting Indigenous entrepreneurship and business development.

As part of the RAP, Moray & Agnew commissioned a bespoke artwork titled 'Yanha yapaneyepuk' ('walk together' in Yorta Yorta language) by Bayadherra, an Aboriginal-owned art business founded by Yorta Yorta siblings Luke and Siena Tieri. The artwork symbolises the beginning of Moray & Agnew's reconciliation journey, representing collaboration, connection and shared progress with Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander communities.

Moray & Agnew is proud of its community initiatives nationwide. In the Hunter

region, the firm partnered with the University of Newcastle's School of Law and Justice in 2021 to establish 'The Moray & Agnew Indigenous Shaping Futures Scholarship in Law'. This transformative scholarship provides annual financial support to an Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander law student facing challenging personal circumstances, helping them succeed academically through assistance with expenses such as accommodation, textbooks and equipment, day-to-day living, travel costs and work placements.

HIA HUNTER HOUSING AWARDS

Butler Building won the pinnacle award at the 2025 HIA Hunter Housing and Kitchen & Bathrooms Awards, being presented the HIA Hunter Home of the Year award for a project described as 'nothing short of a masterpiece'.

The Awards were announced on 18 October in front of a capacity audience of industry leaders and peers from across the Central Coast, Hunter and Mid Coast regions.

The Awards acknowledged the talent of designers, builders, contractors, suppliers and manufacturers who plan and construct quality new homes, townhouses, renovations, kitchens, bathrooms and outdoor projects.

Judged by industry professionals, the best of the regions residential building industry were selected as winners in 37 separate categories.

From its striking use of cuttingedge materials to its flawless detailing. The result is more than a home – it's a work of art. The winning home known as 'Taurean Dream' took out seven individual awards on the night for Butler Building including Renovation/Addition Project of the Year, Bathroom of the Year and Outdoor Project of the Year. The luxury home also took out a

further five awards for two other companies - Mali White Design and Cutting Edge Joinery.

HIA Hunter Executive Director Craig Jennion congratulated Butler Building and all Hunter Award winners and finalists.

"HIA members are dedicated to achieving the very best workmanship and standards in every project they undertake. HIA's Awards provide a tremendous opportunity for our members to showcase their projects and highlight building and design excellence," he said.

The winners of the prestigious HIA Professional Builder awards were Walkom Constructions for Professional Small Builder / Renovator, Hudson Homes for Professional Medium Builder / Renovator, and Eden Brae Homes for Professional Major Builder. James Shepherd was a worthy Apprentice of the Year, while Max Wylie walked away with the award for Emerging Builder.

Other notable winners included Construct Central Coast for the Custom Built Home of the Year, Hunter Homes for Display Home of the Year, RCM Projects for Spec Home of the Year, Stroud Homes Central Coast for Project Home of the Year and Ort & Co Building for Townhouse of the Year.

In the Kitchen and Bathroom categories Cutting Edge Joinery took out Kitchen of the Year'and Butler Building Bathroom of the Year award. Cutting Edge Joinery also took out the Cabinetmaker/Kitchen Manufacturer of the Year award.

Mr Jennion congratulated all 2025 entrants.

"HIA is delighted with the exceptional quality of entries and level of competition this year. In a year that has thrown up many challenges all winners and finalists should be proud to have reached the pinnacle of excellence as demonstrated in these awards," he said.

Overall winners in major categories will now represent the HIA Hunter region at the HIA-CSR Australian Housing Awards in 2026 to compete for national titles against winners from other HIA.

STATE-OF-THE-ART WASTE TRANSFER STATION DESIGN LOCKED FOR MAITLAND

Plans for a \$21.8 million waste transfer station in Maitland are taking shape, as Maitland City Council looks to ensure the long-term viability of its waste facility before landfill airspace is exhausted.

Landfill airspace at the Maitland Resource Recovery Facility (Mount Vincent Road, East Maitland) is projected to reach capacity in 2028, and in preparation Maitland Council is moving forward with detailed designs for a new waste transfer station and sorting infractructure.

Maitland City Council Acting Manager Environment and Sustainability Michelle Lindsay said the upgrade would allow residential waste "to be sorted into waste streams and transported offsite to appropriate recycling or disposal endpoints."

"In addition to allowing the facility to remain open after landfill airspace expires, these works during stage three will improve resource recovery, reduce reliance on landfill, and deliver a modern, more efficient waste management facility that ensures the site can continue to serve Maitland well into the future," she said.

"The transfer facility will also bring us closer to our landfill diversion target of 80% by 2030, by helping us recover more resources and recyclable material before waste leaves the site."

The recent introduction of a Food Organics and Garden Organics (FOGO) service in 2025 is also bringing Maitland City Council closer to achieving its 2030 landfill diversion target.

Detailed design and construction on stage three will run throughout 2025/26, running in parallel with determining infrastructure and funding options for a future fourth stage. Construction on stage three is expected to conclude in early 2028.



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TRIPLE WINS FOR ZEAL FUTURES

Zeal Futures took home three major honours at the 2025 Apprentice Employment Network (AEN) NSW & ACT Awards, held at the Four Seasons Hotel in Sydney in October.

The wins recognise Zeal Futures' commitment to supporting apprentices, trainees, and host employers across New South Wales, as well as the life-changing opportunities created through vocational education and training (VET).

Shoalhaven City Council won the Large Host Employer of the Year Award in recognition of their long-standing commitment to local training and employment pathways. Over the course of the partnership between Zeal Futures and Council, which spans more than 30 years, more than 350 apprentices and trainees have completed their qualifications, with a large proportion moving into permanent roles within Council.

Hunter-based Kasey Lewis won the Women in Trades Trainee/ Apprentice of the Year Award in recognition of her determination, enthusiasm and ambassadorship for women in trades. Beginning her career in graphic design, Kasey found her true calling in the electrical trade, completing an electrical apprenticeship with Zeal Futures and Origin Energy.

The third winner was Shaani Monson, who won the Inclusion Trainee/Apprentice of the Year Award. Shaani completed a Mobile Plant apprenticeship hosted to Whitehaven Coal and consistently impressed with her hard work and commitment. Her achievements were also recognised earlier this year when she was named Apprentice of the Year at the New England Regional Training Awards.

Zeal Futures CEO Sharon Smith said the awards were a powerful reflection of the organisation's mission to help people and communities thrive.

PROPERTY PURCHASE BY CITY OF NEWCASTLE

City of Newcastle has purchased a significant industrial property in Sandgate to augment its long-term financial plans.

The 8.64-hectare land holding is the first Newcastle property acquired under City of Newcastle's Future Fund, which was established to ensure it can meet the need for infrastructure and services across the city into the future.

Executive Director of Corporate Services and Chief Financial

Officer David Clarke said the Future Fund enables City of Newcastle to diversify its revenue base to cater for both the growing population and aging assets.

"Ensuring the long-term sustainability of almost \$3 billion worth of infrastructure we manage on behalf of the community is one of our key responsibilities," Mr Clarke said.

"As our infrastructure ages, the cost of maintaining and renewing these essential assets increases, which is why we proactively set aside funds each year to meet these future needs.

"Our Future Fund is a strategic initiative that enables us to invest our cash reserves into a diversified portfolio of property and commercial assets.

"This latest acquisition strengthens that portfolio and positions us to generate stable returns, protecting our financial position and ensuring we can continue to meet the needs of our growing community without putting extra pressure on rates."

The Rural Drive property includes two warehouses that have existing leases in place with a number of businesses, which will generate ongoing rental income for City of Newcastle.

Mr Clarke said City of Newcastle will also consider potential longer term uses for the site.

It is the third property purchased under the Future Fund, with previous acquisitions including a Bunnings warehouse in Taree and a Wollongong medical centre.



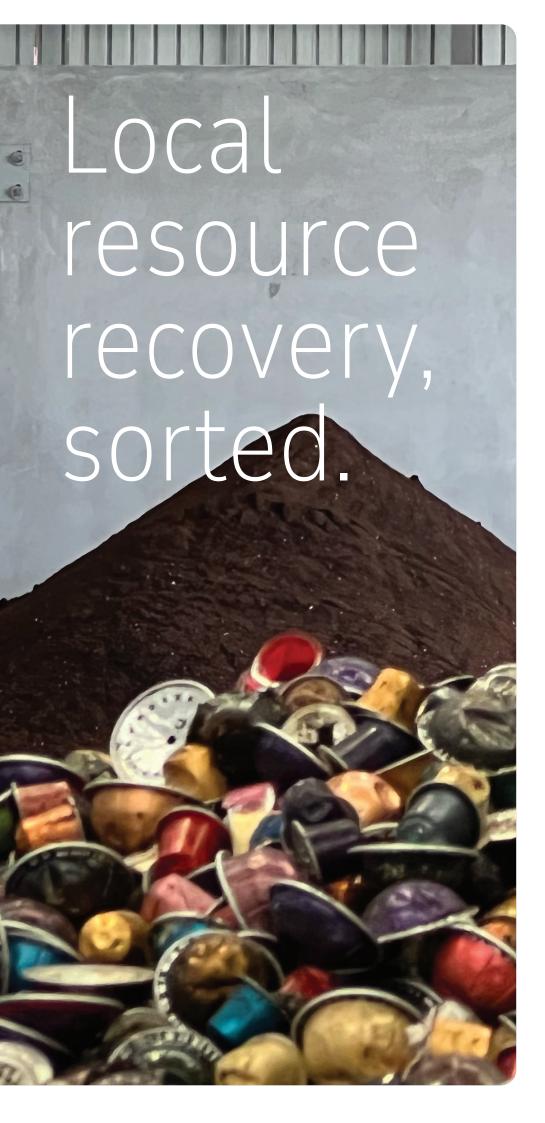
The NSW Government's Aviation Attraction Fund (AAF) will support a brand-new seasonal flight from Hobart to Newcastle, connecting the two cities directly for the first time.

On 2 December 2025, Jetstar will launch the seasonal route, which will operate three times a week from December to April, a link that will give Tasmanians direct access to NSW's second biggest city. The route will unlock access to new visitors for Newcastle and the Hunter, providing a boost for businesses and jobs throughout the region's visitor economy.

Destination NSW is working with Jetstar and Hobart Airport to help promote the service – the third new route this year to be launched through the AAF, which has already connected Newcastle with Denpasar, in Bali, and Perth in 2025.

The new service comes at a transformational time for Newcastle Airport with its new international terminal unlocking opportunities for the region.

It is also a transformational time for the NSW visitor economy amid the recently announced Visitor Economy Strategy 2035, which emphasises the need for investment in aviation capacity to achieve the government's major growth ambitions and that strategy's expenditure goals. The strategy sets out a new roadmap to generate \$91 billion in visitor expenditure by 2035, with a target of 8.5 million new airline seats, as well as 40,000 more hotel rooms and an additional 150,000 jobs.



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HUNTER COMMUNITY RALLIES TO RAISE RECORD AMOUNT FOR CHILDREN'S RESEARCH

The Hunter community has once again shown its generosity for local research at the Hunter Children's Research Foundation's annual Hunter Construction Group's Lunch for the Kids, raising a record \$78,000 for children's health research.

Its second year running, guests contributed and together raised thousands more than the previous year, enabling the charity organisation to fund five research grants at their Annual Awards Night at HMRI on 30 October 2025.

Presented by naming rights partner Hunter Construction Group and held at Spicers Guesthouse in Pokolbin on Friday 19 September, the event was a relaxed afternoon of fine food, local wine and coming together for good.

The highlight of the day was a heartfelt on-stage conversation between Professor Matt Dunn, one of Australia's leading childhood cancer researchers based now at Hunter Medical Research Institute (HMRI) and a past HCRF grant recipient and television host and children's health advocate, Johanna Griggs.

The event also featured a live art experience by renowned Melbourne artist, Angi Dlapiu who brought one family's dream to life through art before the piece was auctioned. A second live art piece was bid on by guests, with Johanna herself taking a personal art piece home from the event.

Funds raised will go directly to children's health research projects through the HCRF grants program.

TOP MARKS FOR PORT OF **NEWCASTLE IN GLOBAL** SUSTAINABILITY RATING

Port of Newcastle has reaffirmed its position as a global leader in sustainability, scoring 100% in the coveted Global Real Estate Sustainability Benchmark (GRESB), while maintaining its 5-star rating for a fifth consecutive year.

The Port was also ranked first in the world for its management score, which recognises its approach to governance and how it manages Environmental, Social and Governance (ESG) risks and opportunities. Port of Newcastle CEO, Craig Carmody said the result was a phenomenal achievement.

"To receive the highest GRESB score of 100 is a testament to the efforts of our Port of Newcastle team to embed ESG best practice processes across the business and to make sustainability a part of not just our culture, but the broader port supply chain through stakeholder collaboration," Mr Carmody said.

"Port of Newcastle has set ambitious targets and KPIs for decarbonisation, diversity and inclusion, and safety, and we have been making efforts to improve our internal systems and increase the transparency of our reporting. To go from a score of 40 in

our first GRESB assessment in 2019 to a score of 100 six years later demonstrates our commitment to ESG and to ensuring our business remains safe, efficient, and sustainable.

"We have made no secret of our diversification strategy, which we believe is key to developing the port of the future. Central to this are our three strategic priorities - a Clean Energy Precinct, Renewables Terminal and Deepwater Container Terminal – which together will deliver generational change, providing employment opportunities and driving economic growth for the Hunter region and the state.

"As a global trade gateway, the Port has also welcomed initial shipments of an expected 30,000 wind farm components, which will be the cornerstone of NSW's clean energy transformation over the next decade."

GRESB is an international sustainability benchmarking tool, providing quantitative insight into the ESG performance of major infrastructure assets.

A 5-star GRESB rating is the highest obtainable rating, which recognises industry leaders in sustainability and is reserved for the top 20% of all companies surveyed globally.

Port of Newcastle has a target for Net Zero emissions by 2040, as outlined in its ESG Strategy. The Port has also resolved to undertake GRESB benchmarking annually as a commitment to sustainability leadership within the ports sector.

\$68,299 RAISED AT BREAST CARE **BREAKFAST**

The PKF Sydney and Newcastle team has announced the success of its 19th annual Breast Care Breakfast (BCB), held on 16 October, raising \$68,299 in support of the Hunter Nurse Education Group (HNEG) and its network of specialist Breast Care nurses across the region.

With over 470 attendees gathering at NEX, the 2025 event marks 19 years of dedicated fundraising for those who care for others during their most vulnerable moments.

"To see our community come together like this, year after year, is truly moving," said Bob Bell, Managing Director at PKF Sydney and Newcastle.

"This breakfast began as a small initiative, and today it's become one of the most important dates on our calendar. We're so proud to be supporting the nurses who support our loved ones."

Breast Care nurses are a lifeline for patients navigating diagnosis, treatment, and recovery. The funds raised go directly toward funding specialised education and development opportunities for Breast Care nurses in the Hunter. Delivered by HNEG, these programs are offered free of charge to nurses, ensuring patients continue to receive the highest standard of care, close to home, for people right here in our community.

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\$18.7 MILLION BOOST FOR BRAIN CANCER BREAKTHROUGH

A Newcastle-led research team, backed by national and international experts, is forging ahead in its mission to develop a life-saving treatment for the most aggressive and lethal of brain cancers – high grade gliomas (HGG), following the announcement of an \$18.7 million Australian Government grant.

The team, led by University of Newcastle Professor Matt Dun, of HMRI's Precision Medicine Research Program, will test a suite of new, next-generation therapies it has developed, including drugs designed to overcome the bloodbrain barrier. The aim is to reach clinical trials within five years, offering renewed hope to patients and families where none currently exists.

The grant is provided through the Frontier Health and Medical Research initiative, via the Australian Government's Medical Research Future Fund (MRFF). The Frontier initiative will provide \$700 million over 10 years to support research that delivers a 'moonshot' by creating a treatment for a currently serious and incurable health condition.

High grade gliomas (HGG) are one of the deadliest brain cancers, striking more than 2,000 Australians every year.

In children, the most common form of HGG is diffuse intrinsic pontine glioma (DIPG), a devastating diagnosis, with most children surviving less than 12 months, even with radiotherapy. In adults, glioblastoma accounts for 65 per cent of all brain cancer deaths and still has no effective treatment.

Professor Dun and his team have identified a critical gene that drives the growth and survival of HGGs.

Their research has shown that blocking this gene with new brainpenetrant drugs, especially when combined with radiotherapy and targeted therapy, can extend survival in preclinical models by more than 150%.

NEWCASTLE ART GALLERY REOPENS ITS DOORS FOR FIRST LOOK INSIDE **EXPANDED BUILDING**

At the end of September the City of Newcastle welcomed the community back into the Newcastle Art Gallery, unveiling the first new spaces completed as part of its landmark expansion project.

Visitors were treated to a taste of the Gallery's \$145 million collection alongside major First Nations commissions and acquisitions, which are on display across three of the new gallery spaces, entry foyer and soaring central atrium.

The celebrations began in the morning with an opening that championed the Gallery's First Nations First ethos and capped off with a high energy First Night Art Party on Laman Street as part of the New Annual festival.

City of Newcastle CEO Jeremy Bath said New Annual was the ideal time to give the community a preview of the reimagined Gallery.

The expansion project has more than doubled the size of the Gallery, delivering an additional 1,600 square meters of exhibition space.

A number of these new spaces have been named in honour of the community members and artists whose generous donations helped make the expansion possible, including Valerie and John Ryan, Margaret Olley, Robert and Lindy Henderson and Mary and Richard Owens AM.

Newcastle Art Gallery Director Lauretta Morton OAM said the expanded Gallery would be a permanent tribute to all those who had shown their support for the project over many years.

Valerie Ryan was a Newcastle Art Gallery Foundation member and former governor. She gifted the residue of her estate, with an estimated value of \$20 million, equally to the Newcastle Art Gallery Foundation and the Hunter Medical Research Institute.

Margaret Olley had a significant and long-standing connection to Newcastle and the Newcastle Art Gallery. Her legacy includes

48 works gifted to the Gallery during her life (often on her birthday) and a \$500,000 bequest for the expansion of the Gallery via the Margaret Olley Art Trust.

Former Newcastle Art Gallery Foundation President Robert Henderson and his wife Lindy are long-time supporters of the Gallery. In 2022, the Hendersons pledged to match the Margaret Olley Art Trust's gift toward the Gallery expansion.

Richard Owens, alongside his wife Mary, was a generous philanthropist and volunteer, pledging \$500,000 towards the transformation of the Gallery. Richard was pivotal in the establishment of the Newcastle Art Gallery Foundation and was Chairperson of the Foundation for some time.

The expansion project is supported by \$5 million from the Australian Government under the Regional Recovery Partnerships and \$5 million from the New South Wales Government under the Regional Recovery Package, as well as \$12 million from the Newcastle Art Gallery Foundation made possible through bequests, gifts and community fundraising over many years. A further \$1 million is currently being sought through the Foundation's public fundraising campaign.

The entire Gallery will be reopened in February next year, in conjunction with a major exhibition of works of art from the collection and the unveiling of the commission by internationally renowned artist Fayen d'Evie.

CONSTRUCTION BEGINS ON THE HUNTER VALLEY'S FIRST NEW HIGH SCHOOL IN 25 YEARS

Construction has officially begun on a new public high school in Medowie, the first new high school to be built in the Hunter Valley in more than 25 years.

Medowie is the fastest growing suburb in the Port Stephens local government area, with the community's population expected to increase by more than 4,000 residents before 2040.

The new high school will feature 29 modern classrooms, specialist workshops and labs, a multipurpose hall, library, outdoor play areas and sport facilities. The school will welcome students on Day 1 Term 1 2027.

The NSW Government has invested heavily into education. Major education infrastructure projects underway or completed across the Hunter include the recently finished upgrades at Hunter River High School and Irrawang High School, and upgrades to Newcastle High School, Gillieston Public School, and Thornton Public School. Planning is also underway for a new primary school and high school in Huntlee.

How to protect your small business from scams

Whether it's fake invoices, fraudulent calls or malware attacks, cybercriminals are constantly finding new ways to steal money, data, and valuable business information.

Unlike larger corporations, small businesses often have fewer staff and resources to dedicate to fraud prevention. Scammers know this and they exploit it. Busy business owners can easily be caught off guard by a convincing email or a professional-looking invoice.

Common scams targeting small businesses Access scams

Scammers pose as banks or trusted partners to trick you into revealing passwords or identifying details. Remember, your bank will never ask for login information or personal data via email or phone. If you're asked for this, you may be the target of a scam.

False billing scams

Fraudsters send invoices for directory listings, advertising, domain renewals or office supplies that were never ordered. They rely on busy staff paying these fake bills without verifying their authenticity.

Overpayment scams

In this scam, a business is tricked into refunding a scammer who claims to have sent too much money for an item you are selling.

Malicious software (malware) can be installed through unsafe links or attachments in emails or text messages. Once inside your system, it can track activity or access files. A related scam called ransomware demands payment to 'unlock' your computer or files.

Online shopping scams

Fake sellers or fraudulent websites pose as legitimate suppliers, luring businesses into paying for goods that never arrive.

Investment scams

These promise big payouts, quick money or guaranteed returns. Always be suspicious of any promise of a high return with little or no risk. If it seems too good to be true, it probably is.

How to protect your business

Scammers are becoming more sophisticated, but awareness and vigilance remain your strongest defence. Encourage a culture of caution in your workplace, where double-checking is second nature and online safety is part of everyday operations.

Educate your staff to look for signals or anything unusual, and verify credentials if they have any doubts of legitimacy. If you think a request is suspicious, independently check business details by doing a search online and/or calling them directly to confirm.

Keep your devices secure. Back up your data, regularly change your passwords and update your security software. Stay Smart Online is the Australian Government's online safety and security service, designed to help everyone understand the risks and the simple steps to take to protect personal and financial information online.

Contact your bank immediately if you feel you have been the victim of a scam, and report the scam to the ACCC.

Protecting your business doesn't have to be complex. By staying informed, questioning the unexpected, and keeping your systems secure, you can safeguard your small business from scammers.

Inflation upturn stalls interest rate cuts

A higher than expected inflation figure for the September quarter has stalled the interest rate cuts by the Reserve Bank and increased the chance that the next interest rate move will be up instead of down.

According to the Australia Bureau of Statistics, underlying inflation for the September quarter was 1% and for the year to September was 3%, significantly higher than expectations of 2.7%. This is the first time in around 3 years there has been an increase in the inflation rate.

Earlier in the year, there was widespread expectations that the Reserve Bank would continue to reduce interest rates, however, this seems to be off the cards for at least the near future.

If inflation does not fall, there is an expectation that the Reserve Bank may increase rates at one of their next meetings.

It may be a delicate balancing act, however, with a recent increase in unemployment, although the labour market remains fairly tight by historical standards.

As always, when borrowing money businesses and consumers are advised to consider their ability to make repayments if interest rates do increase.

I JUST WANNA GO TO WORK AND MAKE THINGS

Tony Lobb Managing Director Brain Industries (International)

"With every new dawn that breaks, let the realisation of being alive fill your heart with awe..."

Roman Emperor and philosopher Marcus Aurelius wrote that nearly two thousand years ago — and it still fires up business people like me today.

We in manufacturing know that feeling. The early starts. The smell of metal and paint before sunrise. The thrill of making something real — something that works, sells, and sometimes even surprises you. The rush when a customer says, "That's brilliant — we didn't think it could be done." We're addicted to that moment. We wouldn't do anything else.

That's why local champions like Varley Group, Whiteleys, Omnia Wheel, Agrana Fruit, Banlaw, and all the other Hunter Manufacturing Awards contenders inspire me daily. They prove this region punches far above its weight. Brain Industries is genuinely humbled to be counted among them. And hats off to the HMA crew for continuing to spruik the quality of what we make right here in the Hunter.

I've been lucky enough to lead an Australian manufacturer with 1,500 employees working on national defence contracts — and now one with fewer than 50 people focused on mining and exports. The scale is different. The challenges? Pretty much identical.

- Get orders in the door and quality products out the door on time and built to last.
- Keep inventing, protecting your IP, and chasing new markets.
- Make a profit (yes, that word!) or you won't keep the lights on.
- Find good people and keep them not easy in today's regulatory maze.
- Stay up to date with equipment and tech while staring cash flow reality in the eye.

• And above all, pay your suppliers — they're your oxygen. But lately, there's a worrying undertone in Aussie manufacturing. My mates at ChatGPT (yes, I ask the robots) tell me insolvencies are up and closures are higher than we've seen in years. One estimate puts it at more than 1,400 manufacturers gone since 2022–23. That's not just numbers — that's experience, ideas, and capability disappearing.

So what's the fix? Part of it's simple: give Australian contracts to Australian builders. With a bias. Yes, I said it. A bias.

If Government awards a \$100 million train contract offshore because it's cheaper, we get trains that often need reworking to meet our standards — at extra cost. But if that same contract went to local builders for, say, \$200 million, what do we gain? Skills. Jobs. Taxes. Payroll. Superannuation. Fuel excise. Real value that circulates through the economy instead of vanishing overseas. Run the pub test — we'd probably double our money keeping it here.

The Federal Government is now talking up a "Back Australia" campaign — our "next making revolution." Sounds great. But before the slogans and the banners, let's fix the basics:

- · Award big contracts locally.
- · Create an employment environment that helps, not hinders, manufacturers.
- Deliver affordable industrial energy.
- Encourage investment.
- · Champion exports.

Ask Tomago Aluminium — they'll tell you what difference the right settings can make.

As for me? I just "wanna" go to work and make things. Because making things is what keeps this country moving — and it's still the most satisfying job in the world.
